## An Organization in Progress

The Arlington Learning in Retirement Institute is always a work in progress. Here's a quick roundup of current activities.

Classes began on March 9 for 21 of the spring semester courses. If you've not yet registered, check the ALRI website to see if openings remain in the other 11 courses scheduled to start in April. Six courses maxed out within two weeks of the start of registration: "Natural Approaches to Wellness," "Arlington History," "Our Legacy from the Middle Ages," "Global Hot Spots," "U.S. Congress" and "Philosophical Aesthetics, or Art: Truth or Deceptions."

Six special events are slated for April and one for May. The special events committee, which organizes events throughout the year, will add May and summer events to the website regularly and announce them to members through emails and mailings.

One new ALRI club has been added to the roster the breakfast club. It meets each Wednesday at 8 a.m. at the Silver Diner in Clarendon. ALRI's five other clubs - book, bridge, current events, ethnic lunch, travel – continue to meet regularly.

The nominating committee is working to complete the roster of candidates for the ALRI board. Sammy Ng heads the committee; members include Mary A. Fitzgerald, John Heyer, Jack Norman, Mary C. Plans are underway for ALRI's annual meeting on Friday, June 12, at 9 a.m. at the Fairlington Community Center, 3308 S. Stafford St. The agenda will include the election of officers.

They're aided by numerous volunteers: course instructors, committee members, class aides and administrative assistants, all essential to a vital organization.

ALRI reached a new all-time high of 563 in course registrations for the spring term as of February 18. Clearly the work of the Academic Programs Committee has again paid off in developing courses of interest to ALRI's membership. And in spite of

the economy's downturn I'm pleased to report there has been no decline in membership.

Five seats on the 14-member ALRI board will become vacant at the end of June. You have all received notice of the formation of the 2009 Nominating Committee, chaired by Sammy Ng and including Mary Fitzgerald; John Heyer; Jack Norman; Mary Pendleton and Ron Wise. ALRI *cannot function* without a team of board members willing to take on the tasks of leading and managing its activities. So if you appreciate what ALRI provides, want to see it continue to evolve, and have skills you're willing to apply, think seriously about volunteering to serve on the board. Terms last one year, and the duties are not onerous. Some of the board positions draw upon good management skills, e.g. Publications Committee chair. Others involve a willingness to develop activities and interact with non-ALRI organizations, e.g. Special Events Chair.

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### FOCUS ON INSTRUCTORS

These profiles of two instructors illustrate the quality of ALRI instructors, their breadth of knowledge and their love of teaching.

#### Irmgard Scherer: Love of Philosophy



Spend just a few minutes talking with Irmgard Scherer and you'll soon recognize her enthusiasm for teaching philosophy.

She developed her love of the subject as an undergraduate. An "older student," she had first devoted time to raising her children and had had challenging life experiences. Studying philosophy gave her a framework for looking at those experiences. Her particular interest in the work of Immanuel Kant eventually resulted in publication of her 1995 book *The Crisis of Judgment in Kant's Three Critiques: In Search of a Science of Aesthetics.* 

In her 16 years teaching at Loyola College in Baltimore, Scherer's teaching style evolved from "very professorial" to one that considers students' input and perspectives. Because philosophy is very abstract, she also finds it important to use "understandable language" without "dumbing down" her material. She provides real life examples to illustrate philosophical principles.

Retired since 2007, Scherer relishes her newfound time to devote to her family as well as the opportunity to teach retirees. Like so many other ALRI instructors, Scherer finds particular rewards in teaching retirees, whose insightful questions and enthusiasm, she says, make teaching them a "privilege." —Peggy Higgins

#### John Edward Niles: Opera Enthusiast

Musician and conductor John Edward Niles considers himself fortunate. While most people link Lexington, Ky., with horse races and bourbon, he associates it with the great music program and fabulous teachers he had as a high school student there in the 1950s.

Teaching was about the only profession open to women then, says Niles, and many of his teachers reminded him of the beloved educator in *Good Morning, Miss Dove*. "My high school was full of 'Miss Doves,'" he recalls. "These women were just about ready to retire, and I got them at their peak, when they were in their prime and sharp, and there for my four years."


Now a "Mr. Dove" at ALRI, Niles draws on his knowledge and love of music and his years of experience to enrich his popular courses about opera and music. His current ALRI course is "Verdi: Revolutionary and Patriot." Niles' previous courses – usually one every semester – have explored Russian opera, opera singers, the history of opera and various composers.



Niles played cello with the Navy Band from 1971 to 1973, and Washington has been his home base since then. He worked with European-American productions from 1987 to 1998 and conducted orchestras in Prague, Helsinki and Linz. Asked for his most significant career achievement, Niles names his 25 years as conductor and artistic director of the Opera Theater of Northern Virginia. In addition, he is musical director of COLVA Productions in Fairfax. and program director of the Evelyn Lear and Thomas Stewart Emerging Singers Program of the Wagner Society of Washington, D.C. Somehow Niles also finds time to work a part-time job at Borders bookstore. —Jody Goulden
